Answer Questions in Short Answer Format:

When we answer short answer questions in a paragraph, we must:

- 1) Answer the question
- 2) Provide an example from the text that illustrates our answer
- 3) Explain how the example/quote from the text proves our answer
- 4) Explain what this information does for the reader: how it drives the story forward.

Or like this: "Question #1) Why does Billy Weaver walk 'briskly' down the street?"

TS: In *The Landlady*, by Roald Dahl, Billy Weaver walks briskly because he is trying to be like the other successful businessmen in his office.

CD: For example, in lines 35-40 the text states "He was trying to do everything briskly these days. Briskness, he had decided, was the one common characteristic of all successful businessmen. The big shots up at Head Office were absolutely fantastically brisk all the time."

CM: This shows that Billy wants to be successful himself, and is trying to be like the older men in his office who he looks up to.

CS: As a result, the readers learns that Billy is young, earnest and hard-working, and seems to trust and admire adults.
